From the Rector

Every year we mark the Feast of St. Alban with our annual parish picnic. Quite often the feast of our patron saint is also marked with the Episcopal visit of one of our Virginia bishops. This year, since we didn't have an official bishop's visit, we had much more leeway in how we observed St. Alban's Day and so we were treated to a marvelous pageant which told the story of Alban. After a quick search on YouTube I found several videos that told the story of the First Christian Martyr in Britain, but none had the charm of our own pageant.

Led by the formidable team of **Cheryl Sinsabaugh** and **Nancy Harrell**, the cast told us the story of Alban, the Roman soldier, who was touched by the plight of a Christian priest who was fleeing from persecution. Alban sheltered the priest and, over time, converted to the Christian faith. While we don't know what transpired in Alban's home, I can only imagine the priest shared with Alban the story of Jesus, and of Jesus' freely offered gift of redemption, salvation and eternal life – the Good News of the Gospel. And, perhaps Alban saw something different in the life of this priest – joy in the face of persecution; peace while facing certain danger? Perhaps Alban saw something in the life of this priest that was lacking in Alban's own life?

At the 8:15 am service on June 25, I briefly told the story of Alban, and compared the story of Alban and the priest to our own story. As Christians, we are called by Jesus to share the Good News of God and of Jesus. We share with others the joy and peace we have found as Christians. The priest shared the Good News with one stranger, Alban, and Alban's witness inspired the conversion of his executioner. And, as we learned in the pageant, because of Alban's witness, the judge stopped the persecution of Christians and, instead of trying to destroy the worship of Christ, began to honor the death of his saints.

Every time we meet a stranger, we are having an "Alban" moment – an opportunity to share Christ's love by our actions. I read in an essay from the (ironically named) Alban Institute, "Like Abraham and Sarah by the oaks of Mamre, we are commanded to show hospitality when strangers appear at the flap of the tent, to open our house and table and God's house and table to these strangers so that they will find safe lodging, nourishment, cool water for the face, the oil of blessing, and rest for the soul." In your travels this summer, as you meet strangers and make new friends, remember Alban and the priest – the meeting of two strangers and of lives changed. –Fr. Jeff

Improvements to St. Alban's Facilities

You may have heard some buzz about the two major projects St. Alban's is working on: Parking Lot Improvements and Kitchen Renovation. Here is the latest on both:

Parking Lot Improvements:

The Parking Lot Working Group decided to start by improving the lighting. With Vestry approval, we are close to signing a contract for the construction of seven light poles that will be fitted with LED lights and will cover the areas of the parking lot that are not currently lighted. **Kit Ryan** is working with our chosen contractor to ensure that we get the softest and lowest lights possible that will still meet our safety needs. With our neighbors in mind, these lights will be fitted with timers so they will not be on all night. The plan will also include lighting for the rectory driveway. The Working Group has worked hard to research alternatives, view examples of the contractor's work, check references and understand thoroughly what we are getting before we make this investment.

Kitchen Renovation:

The Vestry has approved funding for the design phase. The Committee interviewed three architects and sought proposals from two of them. Our next step is to review the proposals and choose one to produce a conceptual design. This phase will take three to four months, as the Committee works with the architect and his team to further define our requirements and come up with a design that works for St. Alban's needs.

Investing in Hope

A few weeks ago, I ran across a story of a wealthy man, Harris Rosen, who has been providing money on a yearly basis in a poor community to provide free child care and pre-kindergarten to young children, and scholarships to all high school seniors headed to colleges and trade schools. Because of his generosity, the high school graduation rate has risen from 25 percent to nearly 100 percent, and almost all the graduates go on to college. Crime in the community has plummeted, and property values have climbed. Mr. Rosen said he just gave folks hope, adding, "If you don't have hope, then what's the point?"

The headline of the story gives the figure \$11 million as what Mr. Rosen had given, and that is a big number, but when you read on, you find out that he didn't give it all at once. He has been investing in hope for more than 20 years. I like to think that we at St. Alban's also invest in hope —the hope that a child will not always be hungry, the hope that the pain of loss will be less tomorrow or the next day, the hope that a person will get well again, the hope that things can change for the better, the hope that others will come to know God, the hope of eternal life. We give that hope through our worship and ministries, because God gives us that same hope. His love flows through us, and we are empowered by the Holy Spirit to do God's work in this world.

As you spend your summer traveling or relaxing or working as usual, I invite you to take some time to consider your investment in hope. How can you invest your knowledge or talents or financial resources, week after week, month after month, year after year to bring hope to others? Where are you called to serve in the ministries of St. Alban's as we bring hope?

Thank you for all you do to make St. Alban's a loving, hopeful community.

From the Deacon

Easter Sunday marked my first anniversary as a deacon. In the busyness of Holy Week, I had a reflection assignment to complete; writing my annual letter to the Bishop. I've continued to reflect on the working of the Holy Spirit through St. Alban's. Here are a few highlights, "through the deacon's lens."

As an introduction to racial reconciliation work, a three-week group met to learn about and discuss the role that contemplation plays to overcome our fear of people we see as "the other." A book discussion on "America's Original Sin" will be followed up by a sermon by one of the discussion group members. Another book discussion is being organized and joint activities with other churches are being explored.

Several parishioners have been involved in interfaith dialogue, including discussions about refugee resettlement. Parishioners attended an open house at a local mosque. Discussions are underway to invite members of the Institute of Islamic and Turkish Studies to St. Alban's for a social in the fall.

Our relationship with Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington evolved to include a toiletries collection and hosting the Northern Virginia Christmas party for program participants. The party brought several Episcopal Churches together to provide gifts, lead activities and to serve the meal alongside the St. Alban's volunteers. The party allowed us to meet our neighbors and to hear about their progress toward self-sufficiency. St. Alban's will host the party again on December 17, 2017.

Our care for children and youth in need is exhibited through our ongoing work with a shelter and two schools. We collected school supplies for children living at Bethany House. The Poe Middle School feeding program served an evergrowing group of students. Our partnership with Belvedere Elementary School continued in a slightly changed form. The students who had been in the homework club were able to participate in other afterschool programs. This change was a great one for the children and coincided with our recognition that St. Alban's could not sustain the volunteer effort required by the program. The number of mentors increased and a team of volunteer coordinators organized the monthly weekend backpack program (see photos page 9).. Through these programs, we provided food for hundreds of children and youth each month.

Our work in the community would not be possible without our openness and our commitment to work together to live out our baptismal promises.

St. Alban's Director of Music Nominated for Area Choral Award

St. Alban's Director of Music, **Fred Binkholder**, was one of four nominees for the **Most Creative Programming** award as part of the J. Reilly Lewis Choral Award for Outstanding Contributions to Choral Music at an award gala on June 6, 2017. The award was based on the varied and creative programming of the Binkholder-led Capitol Hill Chorale of which he has been Artistic Director since 2000.

The awards, whose selections are based on a survey of Washington area choral directors, are made each spring at a gala event sponsored by The Choralis Foundation. Choralis instituted the award program in 2010 as a way of recognizing the Washington D.C. region's rich choral music tradition and the many fine choral organizations in the area. The first award—the Lifetime Achievement award for Outstanding Contributions to Choral Music—was presented to J. Reilly Lewis (long-time Director of the Cathedral Choral Society and founder/director of The Washington Bach Consort) for whom the awards have been renamed. In each subsequent year, in addition to an overall award for Outstanding Contributions to

Choral Music, awards have been given for Best Symphonic Chorus, Most Creative Programming and other categories.

How to Help a Stroke Victim

Emergencies happen everywhere we go—home, in public places and at church. We all want to be prepared to help another person and be a good Samaritan. But, we also want to be sure that we do not harm that person or complicate the situation.

I want to call your attention to strokes. They are one of many emergencies when an observer's actions may be crucial to the outcome. On the opposite page is a summary of information about strokes from the American Heart/Stroke Association.

If you suspect someone has a stroke, CALL 911. Do not give any medications. Do not give the individual anything to drink or eat. Never drive another person to the hospital yourself. It will only delay treatment. Remember, CALL 911. There is only a three-hour window for ischemic stroke patients to have appropriate therapy.

Our parish is fortunate to be very close to the local Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department. The EMT's are the best trained professionals for out of hospital emergencies. We need to allow them to assess someone who is ill even if that means coming into the middle of our services.

Fortunately, we are only a short ride by ambulance to Inova Fairfax Hospital. Both Inova Fairfax and Virginia Hospital Center are certified as Advanced Primary Stroke Centers.

For more information on what to do in an emergency, get the app for your phone <u>First Aid by the American Red Cross</u>. Text "GETFIRST" to 90999 or search "American Red Cross" in the iTunes or Google Play App stores.

If you want to learn even more, Inova Fairfax Hospital, Virginia Hospital Center, the American Heart Association and the Red Cross all offer First Aid and CPR classes locally for the public. I encourage you to sign up for one.
