Dust off your glasses, break out the bubbly, and raise a glass! The new kitchen and bathrooms are here! The last few weeks have been very busy as the final work on the renovation project is underway. We are anticipating an official turn-over date in the next few weeks, once the final inspections take place.

Since our last update, the appliances were installed and finishing touches were completed in the bathrooms, laundry and shower rooms. The installation of the acoustical tile in the parish hall was complete as was the installation of the new outside door. If you were driving on Columbia Pike in front of the church in the last few weeks, you may have noticed the left lane closures in the stretch in front of St. Alban's. This was done for the installation of the new gas line that will support the new appliances.

With all of the major work finished, the kitchen committee walked the property and developed a punch list for the small items that need to be completed. The work will continue on these items until the official turnover date in the next few weeks.

While we would love to formally open and bless the new space, we will have to wait a little longer. From the Deacon

Food for Poe Middle School Families

The pandemic has caused economic and food security issues for many Poe Middle School students and their families. Some students' family members work in jobs that were eliminated, experienced reduced hours, or put them at high risk for COVID-19.

St. Alban's has been a very active participant in community food distributions offered through collaborations developed in March 2020 by Poe's after-school coordinator when school buildings closed. Although the school system has provided breakfast and lunch for students during the pandemic, their families had few options for food support. To address that need, the community food distributions take place in apartment complexes where Poe students live. They do not require referral from a County agency and provide food to many immigrant families. St. Alban's volunteers have participated in the distributions since March 2020. We also provided food for 21 Poe families several times using funds from the Outreach budget and clergy discretionary funds. Until last fall, the distributions occurred weekly. Since then, distributions are scheduled for the first three weeks of the month.



To address the issue, St. Alban's has partnered with Poe Middle School to fill the gap created with the change in distribution schedule. In March, we began a new project. Food for Poe Middle School Families is an extension and expansion of St. Alban's relationship with the school. We will assist 25 families identified by the school counselors as most in need of food during the fourth week of each month when the community food distributions do not take place. The identified families are unable to access food through community programs that require County referrals either because of their immigration status or concerns that asking for referrals will negatively impact their ability to stay in this country.

Coordinated by **Nell Dillard** and **Remy Jurenas** with assistance from **Moira Skinner**, volunteers will shop and bag the groceries. On the fourth Thursday of each month, volunteers will transport the groceries to the distribution site and work with the counselor to give the groceries to the families.

Your pledges and financial contributions make it possible for us to do this important work through Outreach funds.

With the Kitchen Restoration Project nearing completion, the Capital Campaign is also nearing a big milestone. This summer, we expect to surpass \$1 million dollars remitted! Just three years ago, when St. Alban's started down the path towards the restoration of our church building, anxiety persisted as to whether our little congregation of dedicated and forward-looking parishioners could meet these goals. Well, with generous pledges from our parishioners, we are almost there and we'll collect much more than \$1 million dollars as the campaign continues.

Linda and I were also happy to see a number of parishioners and friends of St. Alban's who made a financial gift after the formal campaign ended and construction began. Not only do these gifts help pay down the debt, they also help the Vestry plan a number of follow-on projects, including exterior painting, boiler replacement and landscaping of the Columbia Pike hill, without impacting the capital reserve fund.

We are grateful to all who have contributed to the capital campaign. 


